MaineGeneral Medical Staff Give Back

We are extremely grateful to our Medical Executive Committee and their ongoing support of critical needs across our system! This year, the committee graciously allocated their annual \$10,000 gift to MaineGeneral's Community Health and Hunger Project (\$7,000) and a new infant positioning device (\$3,000). With this gift, our Community Health Department will work with the 27 participating MaineGeneral practices to purchase emergency food bags from Good Shepherd Food Bank and give them to patients in need. The new pediatric infant positioning device will be shared by Pediatrics and the Emergency Department. This device is used to position infants for spinal tap procedures with the goal of increasing accuracy and reducing stress for all involved.

The Community Health Department is beyond grateful for the generous donation from the Medical Executive Committee for emergency food bags. Now when practices screen patients for food insecurity, if someone is positive, they will receive healthy, shelf-stable food to meet their immediate need, as well as information on local resources to help them in the future. Food is truly medicine, and we appreciate this whole-person care approach from our MGH family."

Grant Highlights

The Office of Philanthropy is excited to announce the expansion of our grant work with the establishment of a new Grant Department!

Ashley Tetreault, formerly our Grants and Proposals Specialist, leads the department as our Director of Grants. Linnet Humble (see p. 2) joined us as our first Grant Project Manager, a new MaineGeneral position focusing on system-wide grant management. MaineGeneral also has a dedicated Grants Account Manager, Michele McCarthy, in the Finance & Accounting Department. With our expanded capacity, we plan to secure new funding opportunities and engage more departments systemwide in grant-funded projects.

MaineGeneral competes for private, state and federal grants to help sustain mission-driven (i.e., non-revenue-generating) programs and services, expand existing programs and launch new, innovative services. During the past five years, grant funding allowed us to pilot our remote patient monitoring program, expand our MaineGeneral Harm Reduction services; become a National Child Traumatic Stress Initiative - Category III, Community Treatment and Service Center; support patient needs including transportation and emergency food bags; offer new programs such as Freedom From Smoking® and Next Step Yoga (a recovery yoga class); and purchase equipment such as telehealth stations for our medical staff. Community Health and Hunger Program

\$5,000

This funding from the Hudson Foundation will support the purchase and distribution of emergency food bags for patients who screen positive for food insecurity at 27 of our participating practices. Emergency food bags are purchased from Good Shepherd Food Bank and contain 1-2 days of shelf-stable food.

General Surgery Residency

\$750,000

MaineGeneral received a three-year Rural Residency Planning and Development Grant from the Health Resources Services Administration (HRSA). With this funding, MaineGeneral will create a plan to launch a General Surgery Residency Program accredited by the Accreditation Council for Graduate Medical Education (ACGME).

Early Learning Center II

\$80,000

Funding from the Maine Department of Health and Human Services Child Care Infrastructure Grant Program was used to support renovations of our new Early Learning Center facility. This new facility has space for 68 children of MaineGeneral staff, provides extended hours and a sliding payment scale, and is located on our Alfond Center for Health Campus in Augusta.





Increasing Access to Robot-Assisted Surgery in Rural Central Maine

\$2,000,000

Through the 2022 Community Project Funding/ Congressionally Directed Spending allocations, MaineGeneral was awarded funding to purchase a new da Vinci Xi® robot-assisted surgical system for the Thayer Center for Health and a da Vinci XI® surgical teaching console for the Alfond Center for Health. This technology allows us to perform minimally invasive surgeries with precision and accuracy and teach the next generation of health care professionals.

Enhancing gender-affirming care at our HIV clinic

\$58,000

Our Horizon Program received a capacity building grant from the Health Resources and Services Administration to invest in trainings for our staff to build knowledge and competencies in sexual and gender minority health, as well as create a gender-inclusive environment.



targeted therapies, prevention, screening and education.

The effort to design, build and open the Harold Alfond Center for Cancer Care (HACCC) in 2007 was the first tangible example of our regionalized approach to health care that is centered on the patient and in a beautiful setting offering "healing enhanced by nature." On its first day, the center treated 64 people, a number that pales in comparison to the 200-plus patients now treated daily. In its 16 years of existence, the HACCC's patient volume has grown substantially along with the types of cancer it treats and the medical and support services it offers to patients. Space at the 59,700-square foot facility has been reconfigured routinely as the program has grown, and every square inch of the beautiful facility is in use to serve patients. We are at absolute capacity today and must expand to meet the growing need.

Reasons to Expand



The proposed \$36 million expansion will:

- Upgrade patient experience and lower wait times by increasing the number of exam rooms from 15 to 27 and the number of infusion bays from 34 to 44;
- Facilitate centralized multi-disciplinary care by grouping all exam rooms in pods with dedicated clinical offices;
- Enhance quality of life for cancer survivors through an integrated Medical Oncology Home/Survivor Clinic;
- Improve patient flow and use of space by renovating existing space in Radiation Oncology and Genetics and Research:
- Create space to restore and add education and survivorship programs; and
- Accommodate more patients by expanding laboratory and pharmacy services.



Our goal is to raise \$30 million to support this project. We are incredibly proud and humbled to say that as of November, we are at \$28.3 million capital dollars raised, thanks to the Harold Alfond Foundation and many of you! Rain couldn't hold back hope on Saturday, October 7, as our cancer community gathered for our annual Day of Hope at the Augusta Civic Center. More than 900 people came together to rally around the patients of the Harold Alfond Center for Cancer Care (HACCC), demonstrating to our community that no one fighting cancer fights alone.

Attendees enjoyed an inspiring opening ceremony where the Walk for Hope Marshal Bonnie Collins (see p. 14), shared her story and what it means to her to have Hope All Around Us. The Walk for Hope followed, bringing participants around the beautiful University of Maine Augusta campus in honor of their experience with cancer care. More than 115 attendees received screenings and sampled integrative therapies, and we had hundreds of visits to our Education Pavilion, demonstrating impact that will live long past the day. New this year was our Food Pavilion where Culinary Chef Ben Ramsdell of the Peter Alfond Prevention & Healthy Living Center gave a live cooking demonstration while attendees sampled healthy snacks and recipes.

To top it all off, we surpassed our goal of \$175,000, raising an incredible \$195,000 in support of the HACCC – making a tremendous impact on the cancer center's critical work.

I walked in and it felt like I was home. That was the turning point in feeling I would get the care I needed," she said. "Going there was the best decision I made. They treated me like they would treat their own family members – their mothers, sisters or daughters.

Before July 2022, Bonnie Collins never thought she'd one day wear an inexpensive pink rubber bracelet that has far greater significance than its actual value.

That was before the 20-year registered nurse and Master Gardener volunteer knew of a family history of breast cancer. It also was before she discovered a lump on her rib cage, under her arm.

"Being an experienced nurse, I didn't panic and applied a heated rice pack for three weeks, but it didn't go away," she said. "I realized then I needed to have it looked at."

After a mammogram and ultrasound, a biopsy was needed. Unfortunately, Bonnie learned it would be nine weeks before she could have the biopsy close to where she lives in Holden.

After deciding to call other sites, Bonnie spoke with MaineGeneral's Breast Care Program staff and scheduled the biopsy in mid-September 2022. Four days later, she read "carcinoma" in her online patient portal results.

"It was a complete shock and I started to feel dizzy because I was holding my breath and didn't realize it," she said.

Finding a treatment "home"

Bonnie and her husband Peter traveled to Boston where they learned she had triple-negative breast cancer, an aggressive form with limited treatment options. As they traveled back north afterward, they knew the financial and emotional costs of weekly treatments in Boston would be too great.

Bonnie wanted treatment much closer to home – at the Harold Alfond Center for Cancer Care (HACCC). On their drive from Boston, Bonnie called the center, learned they could take her as a patient and then stopped in with her medical records.

Finding signs of hope all around her

Bonnie noted that being surrounded by people who offer optimism and support makes a difference.

"My mom hugged me and said, 'You be a warrior.' And I feel like I was. I knew I was going to battle but I couldn't do it alone," she said. "I had an army of supporters – my husband and sons, my extended family, my friends and coworkers and the incredible HACCC care team. Hope was truly all around me."

And that pink bracelet mentioned earlier? It's still on her wrist as a reminder and source of inspiration.

"I hate it for what it represents – that I had cancer and I'm a cancer survivor," she said. "But I also love it because it reminds me of how strong I needed to be. It gave me courage to hope for a brighter future and extra time."





As someone with a generous heart, we know you want to give as much as you can to the causes and organizations you care about.

If you have an IRA account and believe in MaineGeneral's mission, a charitable gift from your IRA may be right for you.

What are QCDs?

If you are at least 70-1/2 years old, Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCDs) allow you to transfer up to \$100,000 each year from your IRA to your favorite nonprofit organizations without incurring taxes. QCDs are paid directly from your IRA to a nonprofit (donor-advised funds are not eligible), and you must receive a contribution acknowledgement from the nonprofit to substantiate the QCD. If you file a joint tax return with your spouse, each of you may distribute up to \$100,000 each in QCDs for a total of \$200,000.

Tax Benefits

If charitable giving is part of your retirement plan, IRA Qualified Charitable Distributions can help satisfy your IRA Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) if you have one and could help lower your overall tax liability.



QCDs are nontaxable, but other withdrawals (distributions) from tax-deferred accounts like IRAs generally incur income taxes. When combined with Social Security benefits or other investment income, regular IRA distributions might place someone in a higher tax bracket in retirement than anticipated.

Giving through a QCD could help reduce your tax burden for this year or in the future. Even if you take the standard tax deduction, giving through QCDs vs. cash could still allow you to receive tax benefits for your generosity. A financial advisor can help you navigate your personal scenario.

Initiating a QCD

Donating to MaineGeneral directly from your IRA is a taxfree way to support health care for the community you love. To count toward your annual RMD, the QCD must take place no later than Dec. 31, so plan to initiate the process earlier.

Tell your financial advisors or IRA custodian you want to donate from your IRA and provide the following information:

- Gift designation within MGH (e.g., Hospice, Behavioral Health, Where Needed Most)

Your QCD will mail directly to the Office of Philanthropy. QCD gifts can sometimes arrive without a donor name or contact information. Please also let us know to expect your gift so we can thank you and provide a record of your contribution when it arrives.

Gifts of every size add up to make a big impact! Remember these dates for your 2023 charitable giving:

- · Mailed checks must be postmarked by Dec. 31 for receipt in 2023.
- Online gifts by credit card may be made as late as 11:59 p.m. on Dec. 31. We will email you an immediate gift receipt (some email providers may filter these to a separate folder).
- Qualified Charitable Distributions from an IRA must be postmarked by Dec. 31 to count toward your 2023 Required Minimum Distribution and/or taxes.
- Stock or mutual funds must arrive in MaineGeneral's account on or before Dec. 31 to count for 2023. Brokerages are busy, so begin the transaction early. Call our office to ensure proper credit and receipt.




